Scholarship program to empower survivors of intimate partner violence celebrates 10-year anniversary

DES MOINES, Iowa – October 30, 2020 – Four hundred and eighty-nine survivors of intimate partner violence have had the opportunity to change their futures thanks to the Alice Barton Scholarship Program. Now in the tenth year, the program awards recipients with a \$2,000 scholarship to be used towards tuition, books and fees for classes, and a portion may be used to pay other expenses which support the survivor's education and job training efforts, such as child-care or transportation.

"Receiving the Alice Barton Scholarship was an integral part of the process of rebuilding a life for myself and my young daughter," says Joyna*, a recipient of the Alice Barton Scholarship Program. "I knew I had to further my education in order to overcome one of the greatest obstacles victims face when breaking free from domestic violence, economic disparity between the abuser and the abused."

The Alice Barton Scholarship Program works to empower survivors of domestic violence through education and job training. Economic abuse is a common and subtle form of abuse a person who harms will use to control their victims. By enabling victims to gain new knowledge and skills, the program helps victims increase their self-confidence, find better employment and achieve economic independence.

"The scholarship helped me graduate with honors, which led to employment that affords me the ability to support my daughter," says Joyna*. "Every educational goal I have completed with the help of the scholarship assisted in healing the wounds of abuse and refuting feelings of inadequacy that can plague domestic violence survivors
